

#### SJSU purchases a portable Solar Electric Fence System

For many years the SJSU has used member owned electric fences for contain-

ing high country stock in mountain meadows during grazing periods. This is a timetested method to keep control of mules and horses while allowing them to graze a mountain meadow. Now the SJSU has purchased, through a Resource Advi-



sory Committee grant (US Forest Service), a solar powered, battery backup, Gallagher electric fence system for the Unit's use.

The system is meant for use on work projects and training of member stock so that the minimum amount of impact is caused while grazing pack and saddle stock on mountain meadows. The system will weigh about 45lbs with fiberglass poles, 1320ft of Poly wire, insulators, Gallagher charger, 10 amp/hour battery and 10 watt solar panel.

Those **SJSU** members interested in training their horses and mules for electric fence containment can borrow the system once it is completely assembled to use at your home base. Person training in use of the system will be necessary as it is different from conventional electric fence systems.

#### November 3<sup>rd</sup> at 7,000 Feet

## General Grant Ride


Who would have thought that we'd be riding in short sleeve shirts up at 7,000 feet in November? What a beautiful day to ride. Seven of our members were treated to a not only perfect weather but also learned a little about some of the sights

they saw that day. Those members were: Jo Ann Caufield, Ted Fischer, Cara Peterson, Cindy Schueler, Jan Dovle (new member, joined that day, woo hoo), Debbie McFarren and myself.

We mounted up in the parking area in the shade of a HUGE redwood and stopped for a photo op, then it was off to the trail. We traveled along the Sunset Trail through majestic redwoods and lush greenery. We passed above the Hot Shot camp (The National Park Service established its Interagency Hotshot Crew program in May of 1981, the Arrowhead Hotshot crew being one of the three crews formed at that time. These three crews were the first non-Forest Service Hotshot crews established. They were also the first Hotshot Crews to be funded by the Department of the Interior. Sequoia & Kings Canyon National Parks has been the home unit for the Arrowhead Hotshots since the crew's inception.)



We then intersected with the South Boundary Trail and rode that into Hitchcock Meadow where Ted treated us to a stump climbing (I personally thought this was the highlight of the ride, hehehe). The stumps in Hitchcock Meadow were logged in the late 1800's and most of those trees were about 2,000 years old. After Ted's



show, we traveled down into Big Stump Meadow for our lunch break. The beginning of the path is marked by an information board and map; the trail leads down a hillside into the forest, past one very large sequoia and out into a wide, circular meadow dotted by many weathered stumps and logs, which provide guite a contrast to the green forest and lush grassland all around. The dry, dark, dead stumps seem quite out of place in this otherwise healthy landscape, as if placed here artificially. In the 1880s the meadow housed the Smith Comstock Lumber Mill, an operation which split the timber into fence posts and stakes to be used for vineyards and farms in the Central Valley. One well known stump is of the Mark Twain Tree, a 1,350 year old sequoia that was felled in 1891 after a team of two men spent 13 days sawing it. Now the top is reached by a short ladder, allowing for a close up look at the growth




ring patterns. That is where Debbie and Jo Ann (see below) decided to eat their lunch,

good idea! Another named feature is 'Feather Bed', the name given to a trench that was dug beneath a tree about to be cut, then filled with thin branches in order to cushion the fall, since sequoia wood is guite brittle and liable to shatter on impact. The one remaining

trench is now overgrown with grass and bushes.

After lunch, we crossed over the main highway to head on up to see the Sawed Tree, a tall seguoia that bears the scars of deep cuts from a band saw made over a century ago, though now the tree is perfectly healthy. Quite a sight to see! We then headed back down the South Boundary Trail, then back to the Sunset Trail back to our trailers. Cara, Jan and I decided that 5 hours in the saddle wasn't enough so we headed out to check out the Sequoia Lake Lookout for a spectacular view of the lake and the **Dead Giant**, a massive sequoia that spans the length of the meadow it rests in, well worth an additional hour in the saddle. All in all, happy people and happy horses!

## RIDes by Tara

#### Calendar for January and February

#### Jan 12 - Avocado Lake/Orchard Ride 10 am

A nice 3-4+ hour ride around the lake, break for lunch, then off to the orchards for some conditioning of our horses...on this ride there will be a lake (if you'd like to take your horse in the water), some large river rocks out and around the lake and then smaller rocks in the orchard which my barefoot horse can handle just fine. There will be cars and people around the lake. There is a five dollar fee to enter the park. After our lunch break, we will head out into the orange orchards for some conditioning, some small and some large hills you can climb with your horse if you choose. You might encounter wild boar on portion of the ride but they are usually harmless and run the other way when approached by horses. You might also encounter coyotes and jack rabbits. After our fill of that, we will head back to the lake and our trailers to end our ride. #### Jan 19<sup>th</sup> - Millerton Lake - North side 10 am

An easy dirt trail that goes from the horse corrals on the north side back a few miles around the lake and then back. Approximately length of ride 2-3+ hours including a lunch break. There might be hikers and or bikes on this trail. There might also be car traffic alongside some areas of the trail. There is ten dollar admittance to the lake. This is a nice 2-3 hour ride including time for lunch break. This trail runs alongside the lake, some parts of the trail offer very pretty views of the lake. From the BCHC Bylaws

- To improve and promote the use, care and development of California backcountry trails, campsites, streams and meadows; to advocate good trail manners.
