

MEAT OR VEGGIE LASAGNA

Lasagna is one of the easiest and most satisfying make ahead camping meals ever made. It's also a favorite everyone will love, and there's enough in this recipe to come back for seconds!

INGREDIENTS:

- Meat option: ½ lb of ground beef and ½ lb of spicy Italian or pork sausage, cooked
- Veggie option: 1 cup of diced zucchini and 1 cup of diced carrots with a ¼ cup of nutritional yeast (mix the veggies together with the nutritional yeast).
- 1 package of no-boil lasagna noodles
- 1 beaten egg
- 1 ½ cups of ricotta cheese
- 12 oz. of mozzarella
- 1 cup of grated Parmesan
- 12 oz. of spaghetti sauce
- 8 oz of pesto



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat 38 Coals for distribution of 16-22 for a 12 in. dutch oven
- 2. Lightly oil the inside of your dutch oven
- 3. Combine the egg, ricotta, and Parmesan
- 4. Combine ½ of the spaghetti sauce with either the sausage or the veggies
- 5. Cover the bottom of the dutch oven with non-veggie or sausage sauce and then layer with no-boil lasagna noodles. Add a layer of pesto on top of the noodles and a layer of the veggie sauce or sausage sauce with ground beef. Add a layer of the ricotta mixture and mozzarella cheese. Then cover with noodles.
- 6. Repeat this ending with a layer of just non-meat or veggies sauce
- 7. Bake in the dutch oven for about for about 25-30 minutes
- 8. Add a generous cup of mozzarella cheese to the top of the lasagna and cook for about 10 minutes or until the cheese is browned
- 9. Remove from the coals, let it sit for about 10 minutes, and serve!

Directions: The camp is in Sequoia National Forest on the edge of Sequoia-Kings Canyon National Park (you have to enter the park to get here). From Fresno, CA, take highway 180 eastward to The Generals Highway (Highway 198) and turn right onto General Highway go about 7 miles to Forest Road 14S11 and turn left. There is a Big Meadows sign there; Road 14S11 is paved; the camp is about 4 miles up the road (camp co-ordinates are 36°43'01.76N 118°50'57.71W).

CALIFORNIA RIDING AND HIKING TRAIL (BADGER FLAT)

Our Unit was able to find the time to hit the California Riding and Hiking Trail this year. It has been severely neglected for about 8 years. The local Cattlemen have worked enough on this trail to get their cattle to land in which they have grazing rights. Yet, they often just find a path of least resistance. So, it is up to FS and volunteers to clear the mapped trails. If these trails don't get cleared, we are going to lose them! Some have said that is not so, but I have already come across a few respectable and educated people that have proof that valued trails have disappeared from current maps. Food for thought!

Lois Patten and I took a recon ride to see exactly what was going to be on our upcoming agenda. We did not get very far before we ran into an area that was so convoluted that going around was also very difficult. We decided that was the first area that needed our attention. As we continued farther down the trail, we came upon quite a few other areas that were going to take up another day of our planned weekend. All the work that we found was not only going to take up the entire weekend. It wasn't even close to the Wilderness boundary.

As our dates became closer, we were informed by local riders the trail had been cleared through to Rock Meadow. It is 7 miles to Rock Meadow from the trailhead near Badger Campground. Karen Daughrity, Bethany Smith and I saddled up a few days before our Work Party Weekend and rode all the way to Rock Meadow. During that ride we found that the convoluted area I had mentioned above had indeed been cleared. Yet, there were still many trees covering the trail. So, plenty of the trail still needed to be cleared. In addition, some of the work arounds were just off the trail. Those areas would need the original trail reestablished. I took pictures of 8 sites that required work before the Wilderness Boundary. Some of the sites had multiple trees. The worst areas were in the Wilderness. Fortunately, there were only 2 of the 5 areas that were going to take a lot of work.

When I arrived, Brian Jones, Lois Patten, Jim and Doug Laber had already set up camp on the morning of August 16th. We all tacked up and rode out to get started. The plan was to get all the front forest cleaned up on Friday. By 4 o'clock in the afternoon we were done clearing the trail all the way out to the Wilderness boundary. We accomplished our task and made it back to camp with quite a bit of energy left in

the tank. Which we will all need for the long ride into the Wilderness on Saturday morning.

On Friday afternoon Steve Naylon arrived to prepare food, keep camp, and monitor the radios. That night we were having Carne Asada Tacos, with all the trimmings. The evening fellowship was very enjoyable and by 8:30 that evening we all said good night. We turned in early knowing Saturday was going to be a long day. As expected, the next day was long. We were in the saddle longer than an hour before we came to our first hard site. In the Wilderness we are not allowed to use motorized equipment. By 10:30 am we were all in the saddle and packed with all the hand tools, silky saws and safety gear we were going to use in the Wilderness. Our first major dead fall was a challenging obstacle. It was the first of the 2 large jobs and took us an hour and 40 minutes to complete. Not bad for the huge mess it was. There were three logs in a six-foot area that had to be removed. It was already 2:30pm. We elected to keep going given there was only one other job to do. Although it was large also and a big mess, it was only one tree. We finished in about an hour and 15 minutes. We still had the ride back. When Bethany, Karen, and I rode back from Rock Meadow it took a solid 2 hours with horses that moved out nicely, rested riders, and no pack animals. Our ride back to camp was going to be long. We made it by 6:40pm. Steve had dinner just about ready. We were so thankful. All the work that everyone did was extremely impressive. A special thanks to Brian Jones, first year member and new to work parties. The night ended early again. We all felt super good about the work we had accomplished. I suggested a ride to Twin Lakes the next day.

Sunday came too fast for me. I enjoyed the morning snuggled in my camper. They had to call me to breakfast this time. After a wonderful morning meal, we packed up our camp and readied our horses for a fun ride to Upper Twin. My Aunt, Lois Patten, did not go with us this time. The Lake was spectacular as usual. The horses drank well and enjoyed the green grass while we ate lunch and took pictures. It was a great work weekend and ended with a beautiful ride to Upper Twin Lake.

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ESCAPING HEAT WITH ADVENTURE AT SHAVER HORSE CAMP

In July, summer temps on the coast got crazy. Yep, it happens! 121.8 degrees at my place in Creston July 6, a record, and temps hanging out in the 100s and 110s for weeks thereafter. So it was time to get out of Dodge. Shaver Horse Camp seemed an ideal option for an easy getaway. Indeed, this visit didn't disappoint!

My first stay at the Shaver camp was last year on my way to a week-long pack out of Courtright. With its pens, shade, ample space for rig, plus shaded picnic tables and a fire ring with really nifty swinging grill, it turned into an easy overnighter. My mare appreciated the smooth-wire pen, and my trouble-making little mule loved rolling under the bottom wire to graze in the camps meadow. (Hobbles to the rescue!) This year, however, Shaver Horse Camp was the intended destination for two rigs, two horses (no trouble-making mule this go), two women and a dog. It was new associate member Jane Wilson's first trip in to camp and I was happy to guide her in. Ruth, our camp manager, provides great information as soon as registration is paid (only \$10 a night!) including current fire restrictions (if any), easy-to-follow directions to the gate, and the current gate code. (Close the gate behind you when you go in.)

The earliest we could coordinate our own schedules to get up there was July 30-August 2. Registration was easy. Just contact Shaver Lake Camp Host and SJSU Member Ruth Cramer at (559) 417-3878 and/or racramer@outlook.com. She'll get back to you ASAP.

We left the coast before sunrise to avoid the Valley heat, and made it to camp shortly after lunchtime. We took our time settling in to the clean camp by checking the paddock fences (all up and ready), turning the bathtubs right-side up, settling in the horses, and cleaning out the fire pit and surrounding area.

Wednesday morning, after a leisurely breakfast, we decided to saddle up and start checking out the lake trails. Though I'd been to camp last year, neither of us had explored the area. We found our way to Chipmunk Cove where we saw more osprey in one place than I can ever recall having seen anywhere . We dipped our feet in the lake, watched families with young kids waterskiing and cheering each other on, then carried on a loop past the Fishing Club, above Stevenson Cove, and back to camp for an 8.5-mile easy day out. We enjoyed a lovely fire with wood already stacked in camp (and left loads more for next campers).

The next day we loaded up for the relatively short drive up past Huntington Lake to take the Potter Pass Cutoff Trail into Kaiser Wilderness. There are multiple trail options here, and at Potter Pass we opted for the drop down into Twin Lakes. We met a group of young campers from Golden Arrow Camp

backpacking their way out. We talked about trail etiquette with horses and hikers, and swapped info which led us to choose our picnic spot at Lower Twin Lake rather than Upper which was already pretty populated for the day. It was a good call; we had the lake to ourselves for the most part, found a picnic spot, let the horses rest, graze and water, and took a dip in the wonderfully cool, clear lake. Then it was back the way we came for a 6.8-mile day with decent long, slow training climbs and descents.

We had to head home Friday, and wanted to beat the heat again, so we rose at dawn, did final cleanout of pens, turned the tubs on their sides so they won't fill with pine needles, made sure the fire ring was doubly doused and cold, and loaded up.

This camp is a great resource for SJSU members. Our host keeps it nice and asks us to help by following some basic pack-it-in/pack-it-out etiquette. The blue room has been clean and well stocked when I've been there. It's also important to note there is no water here, so bring enough for yourself and your animals. We brought a cart to carry our water cans from the rigs to the pens where we provided our own water buckets. We used the bathtubs as feed troughs. There are no RV hookups of any sort, and while there's ample shade at any given time of day around camp, there's good sun in the center of the camp for solar rigs. 



For that reason your unit board of directors has made this shirt availble for safety on trail rides and work parties as well as a way to promote our unit and its activities.




